Ridgewood Water Receives Leadership Award

Yolanda McCollom of Ridgewood Water (second from left) recently attended the American Water Works Association's Annual Conference & Exposition in Washington, D.C., for the Lead Service Line Collaborative's Honoring Excellence in Lead Service Line Replacement Initiative awards ceremony. Sixteen individuals and/or groups from around the country received awards. The Jersey Water Works Lead Service Line Implementation Workgroup received the **Policy Innovation and Leadership Award**. Ridgewood Water was a founding member of the JWW LSL Implementation Workgroup, with Director Richard Calbi Jr. initially serving as co-chair. McCollom has served as co-chair since 2025, participating in monthly workgroup meetings and water industry conferences to share LSL Replacement Program strategies.

Raise Your Mower Blade to 3 Inches or Higher

Raising your mower blade to at least 3 inches can significantly improve your lawn's ability to retain moisture, helping you maintain a healthy lawn while reducing outdoor water use.

Longer grass blades:

- Reduce evaporation
- Promote deeper roots
- Improve drought tolerance
- Suppress weeds
- Reduce heat stress

Ridgewood Water Hosts NJDEP

Ridgewood Water was pleased to welcome representatives from the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection to the **Ames PFAS Treatment Facility in Wyckoff** for an educational tour led by Director Richard Calbi.

During the visit, Calbi provided an overview of the facility's granular activated carbon treatment process and Ridgewood Water's proactive efforts to reduce regulated PFAS compounds in treated drinking water to undetectable levels by the first quarter of 2027.



PFAS Treatment Partnership



NJIT's Center for Translational Research facilitated an introduction between Ridgewood Water and **PFASolve** this past year. "PFASolve is developing a testing method that delivers results in just 24 hours, compared to our current turnaround time of two weeks or more," said Richard Calbi, director of Ridgewood Water. In addition, PFASolve is exploring ways to extend the life of the granular activated carbon filters used in Ridgewood Water's PFAS Treatment Facilities. "Having access to the latest technology for PFAS remediation is critical to serving our communities' need for safe water," Calbi continued. "Collaborating with PFASolve can help us become a model for other utilities and providers."

Is Your Rain Sensor Working?

Did you know that all automatic irrigation systems are required by ordinance to have a functioning rain sensor? A properly working rain sensor automatically shuts off your sprinkler system when it rains, preventing unnecessary watering and helping to conserve our water supply. Please take a few minutes to **inspect your rain sensor** and make sure it's operating correctly.

New Well Drilled and Online

It may look unassuming, but this is a powerful addition to Ridgewood Water's system. We're pleased to announce that **Marr Well in Wyckoff is online.**

With the addition of Marr Well, Ridgewood Water operates 53 groundwater wells. The new well is capable of producing more than **500,000 gallons of water per day**, or approximately 15 million gallons each month, helping strengthen the reliability and resilience of our water supply for the communities we serve.



PFAS Free by First Quarter of 2027



Ridgewood Water continues to make significant progress in our effort to remove PFAS from the drinking water supply. **Eleven of Ridgewood Water's 12 new PFAS treatment facilities will be fully operational by the end of 2026.**

Seven treatment facilities are already online, and four more are on track for completion by the end of this year. The final facility, delayed due to an NJDEP-required archaeological study, is expected to become operational in the first quarter of 2027.

When the system-wide project is complete, all regulated **PFAS compounds in Ridgewood Water's treated water will be reduced to undetectable levels**, surpassing the EPA's drinking water standard of 4 parts per trillion.

Hydrant Inspections Are Underway

Hydrant inspections are underway across the Ridgewood Water service area. Every year, Ridgewood Water inspects all **1,767 fire hydrants** to ensure they are in proper working condition and ready when firefighters need them most.

Some of the items checked during the inspection include:

- Obstructions that could interfere with hydrant operation
- Cracked or missing caps
- Leaky or broken nozzles, gaskets and valves
- Main valve leaks
- Water flow



These inspections help identify maintenance needs before they become problems, ensuring our hydrants remain reliable for emergency response and protecting the long-term integrity of the water distribution system.

628 Lead Service Lines Replaced

From July 1, 2025, through June 30, 2026, Ridgewood Water has replaced **628 lead service lines**. Does yours need to be replaced? Are You Ready to Go Native?

Choosing native plants instead of grass is a smart way to create a healthier, more sustainable yard. Consider this:

1. Native plants are adapted to our local climate and soil, so they need less watering, fertilizer, pesticides and maintenance once established.

2. They provide essential food and shelter for pollinators, birds and other wildlife.

3. Their roots help reduce erosion, absorb rainwater and filter pollutants, while the reduced need for fertilizers and pesticides helps keep waterways cleaner.

4. Native plants aren't just for wildflower meadows. They can work well in foundation beds, borders, ground covers, woodland gardens and more.

Is Your Toilet a Water Thief?

Did you know that a leaking toilet can waste **200 gallons of water a day**? Be sure to check your toilets for leaks and make repairs promptly. One simple way to test for a leak is to place a few drops of food coloring in the toilet tank. If the color appears in the bowl without flushing, you likely have a leak.
